School Updates

Ngaa mihi – Thank You for Attending Whaanau Conferences

A big thank you to all the whaanau who attended our recent Whaanau Conferences. Your time, encouragement, and support make a real difference in your child's learning journey. These conversations are such an important part of celebrating progress, setting goals, and helping students make positive choices for next year and beyond. We value the partnership between home and school and know that together we can help our young people thrive both academically and personally.

Whaanau Smiles - Free Dental Service Onsite

We are fortunate to have Whaanau Smiles Dental Service onsite, providing free dental care for our students. This is a great opportunity to ensure our young people are keeping up with their oral health in a convenient and supportive setting. We encourage whaanau to make use of this service while it is available. Good dental care supports overall wellbeing and helps our rangatahi stay focused and confident in their learning.

September Literacy and Numeracy Exams

The second round of Literacy and Numeracy exams is coming up early next month. If students were absent for the May exams or didn't pass them, they have been re-entered for the September exams. Students in Year 10 and who weren't entered for the exams in May, have also been entered. Students who have been entered for the next round of exams have been emailed as have their parents/caregivers. The exams are on the following days:

- · Numeracy (Years 11 13) Tuesday 2nd September
- · Literacy Reading (Years 10 13) Wednesday 3rd September
- · Literacy Writing (Years 10 13) Thursday 4th September
- · Numeracy (Years 10) Tuesday 9th September All four exams are in the morning and students should report to the hall at 8:45am

Getting Ready for the Literacy and Numeracy Exams

The exams are completed online, and students must do a few things to get ready. Firstly, they must have an NZQA Learner login. Instructions on setting up an NZQA Learner login can be found here: <u>Create or activate account :: NZQA</u>. Secondly, they must have Google Chrome downloaded on their laptop. The evening before the exam they should make sure their laptop is fully charged, and they should bring their charger with them to the exam.

Practice Assessments

A good way to prepare for the exams is to do one or more past papers. This will help students familiarise themselves with the Assessment Master platform as well as the layout and style of the questions.

Once students have set up their NZQA login they can access past papers by logging into the NZQA website. From the menu on the left of the screen, they should select Find past digital exams. Under Select a subject they should choose Literacy Reading, Literacy Writing or Numeracy. Under Select a level they should choose Level 1. They should then follow the onscreen instructions. Please note that NZQA turn off access to the past papers during the day when students are sitting exams.

Polly Text to Vote

Polly is the name of the text-to-speech feature built into Assessment Master. Polly will be available for the Writing and Numeracy exams, but not the Reading exam. All students have access to Polly but must have headphones if they want to use it.

NCEA Checklist

Here is a list of things for students to check off before each exam:

- 1. Can I log into my NZQA account?
- 2. Do I have Google Chrome on my laptop? (If not, download it.)
- 3. Is my laptop fully charged?
- 4. Do I have my laptop charger in my bag?
- 5. Do I have a calculator for the Numeracy Exam? (You cannot use the calculator on your laptop or phone)
- 6. Do I have a pen or pencil to write notes or calculations? (We will provide you with refill.)
- 7. Do I have headphones that connect to my laptop? (Only needed if you intend to use Polly, the text to voice feature built into Assessment Master.)
